

# The Village of Northfield

## REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING

November 13, 2013

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Jesse J. Nehez at 7:30 p.m.

### **PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE was recited**

ROLL CALL: The Roll Call was taken by the Finance Director, Monica James. The following were present: Mayor Jesse J. Nehez; Mary Volny, John Schlueter, Linda Bowen, Karyn Selle, Beatrice Greenlee and Nick Magistrelli. In addition, Law Director, Brad Bryan, Finance Director Monica James, Police Chief Mark Wentz, Fire Capt. Colt Eberling, and Village Engineer Richard Wasosky were present. Service/Building Supervisor Jason Walters was not present

### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:**

A motion for approval of the October 23 2013 minutes was made by Karyn Selle seconded by Mary Volny, passed with 5 ayes, Nick Magistrelli abstained.

### **PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, MEMORIALS AND REMONSTRANCES:**

Mayor Nehez announced would deviate from the Agenda.

Resolution 2013-125 – 1<sup>st</sup> Reading – An Emergency Resolution Confirming The Mayor/Director Of Public Safety's Appointment Of Edward Carlile To The Rank Of Sergeant With The Police Department

A motion to suspend the three reading rule was made by Beatrice Greenlee, seconded by Mary Volny, passed with 6 ayes.

A motion for passage was made by Linda Bowen seconded by Beatrice Greenlee, passed with 6 ayes

Chief Wentz gave a short talk, explaining the path that Sgt. Carlile had taken. Chief Wentz then swore-in Sgt Carlile and pictures were taken.

### **GUEST SPEAKER: ReWorks Executive Director, Yolanda Walker - The Draft Solid Waste Plan**

Ms. Walker passed out informational packets to the Mayor and Members of Council. She gave Finance Director, Monica James a packet of information to submit to Summit Reworks. Ms. Walker gave a brief presentation of the benefits of recycling and that the program is being expanded to include schools and business. Under this new program, organic material is accepted, it is recycled into compost.

### **REPORTS OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS:**

- A. MAYOR JESSE J. NEHEZ** stated the Rocksino has been rescheduled to open on December 18. Mayor Nehez had the opportunity to tour with the Fire Department last night and everything is looking good. Mayor Nehez stated that the traffic lights on Northfield Road in front of the Rocksino were in test phase, the crosswalk and school signals were being installed in front of Lee Eaton School.
- B. FINANCE DIRECTOR MONICA A. JAMES** stated she had completed the September Reconciliations but was unable to get copies for Council; she should be able to have them by Friday.

**C. ENGINEER RICHARD WASOSKY**, see attached report. In addition Mr. Wasosky stated the Route 8 paving by the State would begin in August and be complete by the end of October, 2014.

Mrs. Volny asked if the residents were notified about the moving of the mailboxes on Summit Ave. during the construction.

Mr. Wasosky explained that he had spoken to the Postmistress and she explained that if a Postal Carrier felt it was unsafe to deliver the mail, it was their discretion not to do so. Therefore, the decision had been made to move the mailboxes to a central location to aid the Postal Carrier with the delivery of the mail.

Mrs. Volny asked if the residents had been notified.

Mr. Wasosky will notify.

**D. LAW DIRECTOR BRADRIC BRYAN**, had nothing to report

Mayor Nehez asked how the court case went.

Mr. Bryan explained that the home owner on Fell Ave was storing heavy trucks on their property. He was taken to Court and was given until December 1, 2013 to have them removed. At this time, about ¾ of the vehicles have been relocated.

Mrs. Selle asked if the radios will support paging of the personnel.

Capt. Eberling stated that they were not but most of the paging is now being done by cell phone

Mayor Nehez asked if the Rocksino would be paying for the additional amplifier need at the facility

Capt. Eberling stated that they would

Mrs. Selle asked about the scoring for the ISO inspection, would we be notified immediately so that we could notify local business.

Capt. Eberling stated this was just the preliminary phase, basically an informational gathering only But The Committee will advise of ways to improve our scores.

Mrs. Volny asked what the surrounding communities, scores are.

Capt. Eberling will look into, is not sure.

Mrs. Volny asked if the Council or Fire Department would notify the business of the score

Capt. Eberling was not sure of the proper procedure but would check with Chief Buss

Capt. Eberling asked if the heavy equipment especially on Summit Ave, could be asked not to block Fire Hydrants.

Mr. Wasosky explained, this is where the finish for the night, is a large hole, covered with a grate, and then the machinery sits atop, for security and protection reasons. Unless the Village wants to pay the Overtime for them to stop in a location away from a hydrant, they will stop, where they stop.

Mr. Bryan explained that the pay ordinance is again large due to the payment of almost \$250,000.00 to Perram Electric for work completed.

Mr. Magistrelli stated that the September and October Mayor's Court Reports had been received by Council, would like to approve.

Mrs. James stated that the Ordinance for payables should have been 2013-133.

A motion to amend and approve the pay ordinance from 2013-124 to 2013-133 was made by Mary Volny seconded by Karyn Selle, passed with 6 ayes.

**ROADS/PUBLIC WORKS, John Schlueter**, wanted to thank Mr. Wasosky for the informative report that he gave. Mr. Schlueter asked if the Fire Department would be testing the new Traffic Signals.

Mr. Wasosky stated that they should and asked Capt. Eberling to make sure it was done, including the lights on the side streets, not just the main road.

Mr. Magistrelli asked how the timing of the traffic signals was determined.

Mr. Wasosky explained through the traffic study that was done prior to all the construction. Mr. Wasosky also explained that the purpose of the testing is to determine that the sequence is correct. He also stated the timing will be adjusted once the Rocksino is open.

Mr. Bryan stated this was the information given to him by Chief Buss, will need to receive clarification. And yes, this only gets the process started, no commitment to purchase the radios.

Mr. Bowen asked that this legislation go on 3 readings, she stated that the Wages and Working Conditions Committee was never notified.

Mr. Bryan asked Council if they would like to go into Executive Session.

Mr. Schlueter asked that the Village look into the issue of Panhandling and possibly pass legislation. With his work as a Minister, he has seen instances where it may be needed.

Mrs. Bowen announced the next meeting of the Blockwatch is Wednesday at 6:00 p.m. The Prosecutor's office will be discussing Sex Offenders.



**ENGINEER'S REPORT – RICHARD S. WASOSKY, P.E., P.S.**

**November 13, 2013**

*Subject:* Northfield Road and Houghton Road Sanitary Replacement Sewer

*Comment:* The testing of both the Houghton Road and Northfield Road sanitary sewers was completed on November 1, 2013, and the televising of the Houghton Road sewer was completed the same day. Repaving of the Houghton Road sewer trench was completed the next week. The Contractor has to complete the punch list items to finalize the project. The regarding and reseeding in front of the Village Hall will not be done until next Spring.

*Subject:* Summit Avenue Sanitary Sewer Replacement and Elm Pump Station Elimination

*Comment:* The Contractor, DiGioia-Suburban Excavating, LLC has completed approximately 1275 feet of the 12 inch sanitary sewer from Northfield Road to just beyond House No. 127. We have had problems with the postal delivery service, and the existing road is breaking up due to the very heavy construction equipment and the vibratory compaction.

*Subject:* Northfield Racino Traffic Signals

*Comment:* Perram Electric, Inc. has completed the signal installation, as well as the pavement markings and signing for the project. The signals were turned on today for the 10 day test period. Jason and I will be doing the final inspection and punch list items during the next 10 days.

*Subject:* Northfield Rocksino Final Inspection for Northfield Road Area

*Comment:* Jason Walters and I did a final inspection along the east side of Northfield Road tree lawn and pavement area from the Koncal Veterinary Building to Sagamore Road on November 9, 2013. A punch list of items needing correcting was given to Gilbane Construction. Repairing cracked or sunken sidewalk and fixing the Northfield Road gutter areas were the major areas of concern. The Sagamore Road entrance area at the Rocksino was not complete at the time of our inspection. We will inspect this area after the Rocksino notifies us that it is complete.

## Police Department Report by Chief Mark Wentz

### POLICE PERSONNEL:

- Congratulations to **Det. ED CARLILE** on his promotion to the rank of Sergeant. He will officially be sworn in as Sergeant at tonight's Council Meeting.
- **Part-time Officer CRAIG WILSON** is still under consideration for a full-time position with the Macedonia Police Department, as is **part-time officer COREY ZIDLICKY**. Both had follow-up interviews, but neither has received a final offer of employment.
- **Part-time Officer PATRICK PIZZULI** originally rejected Akron PD's offer of full-time employment, but has since reconsidered and signed their offer of employment. He is set to begin the Akron PD Police Academy in February 2014.
- The background check on police candidate **CRAIG SIRNA** is completed. Craig is a 25-year veteran of law enforcement, with the last 22 years with the Bedford Hts. Police Department. He is a certified Field Training Officer and has held several positions over the course of his career. He retired from Bedford Hts. in 2012 and is currently employed in a reserve capacity with the North Randall Police Department. Craig is well known to Chief Wentz and comes highly recommended by past employers and his references. He had a strong interview with Chief Wentz and Lt. Mackie and is recommended for hire by both of them. Given his knowledge, experience and familiarity with the area, his field training would be brief. He would fill an immediate need for manpower, particularly in the event we lose one, two or all three of the part-time officers mentioned above. We will be sending Craig for his medical physical. No polygraph is needed as he recently took one for another department and we were given the results, with his permission.

### HARD ROCK ROCKSINO Update:

- **Chief Wentz, Lt. Mackie**, along with **Hard Rock Director of Surveillance & Security, Kevin Goskowski**, conducted a walk-thru with the **Summit County Metro SWAT Team** commanders on Monday, November 11, 2013. An Active Shooter Roundtable discussion and training with select members of the Metro SWAT Team and the Northfield Village Police Department, as well as Hard Rock security personnel, will take place this coming Monday, November 18, 2013 from 8–12 Noon. The SWAT Team has again extended their offer of manpower, again at no cost to the Village, for the Grand Opening, now set for Wednesday, December 18, 2013 at 12:00 Noon.

### LOCKER ROOM UPDATE:

- The lockers have been installed and are in use by the officers. Lowe's will be returning to do some finishing work and install two more cabinets, the sink back splash, and shelving units inside the closet.

## **Activity Report**

- A detailed copy of fire department activity is available upon request.
- As of *November 12, 2013*, NVFD responded to a total of **408** incidents. **361** of those incidents were EMS related and **47** incidents were FIRE related.
- NVFD has provided mutual aid **32** incidents, provided automatic aid **4** times, and received mutual aid for **13** incidents

## **Department News**

- **800MHz Summit County Radio System** – Guest Dale Kurcsak is here from B&C Communications to give an overview of the system. A 75/25 grant through Summit County is available until April. The resolution on the agenda tonight would allow the fire department to look into and apply for the grant. The radios have been tested throughout Northfield and have proven to provide much clearer and reliable radio communications. This system would also allow the fire department to comply with Ohio's interoperability plan. Applying for the grant does not lock Northfield into accepting the grant. Fire District 27 was recently awarded this same grant. Boston Heights / Valley Fire District, Twinsburg Police/Fire, most of Summit County and several departments to our North will all be moving to an 800Mhz system in the next year. If no planning is done now, the fire department will find itself unable to communicate with many of our neighbors. The initial cost estimate for the fire department to move from our current system to the 800 system is about \$85,000. The grant would help defer much of the cost. There are user fees associated with this radio system (\$12/Radio/Month), but costs for radio system infrastructure such as towers, repeaters, etc, are removed. Please ask Mr. Kurcsak any other questions you may have on the system.

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- **Grants** – We are participating in a number of fire grant programs at this time. NVFD will be applying for hydraulic rescue tools. We are also participating in a number of regional grant initiatives for the replacement of self-contained breathing apparatus, fire officer and incident command system training, and supporting Macedonia Fire Department's proposal to replace their ladder truck.
- **Insurance Services Organization Review** – On November 20, 2013 Christian Ball from I.S.O. will be at NVFD conducting a department evaluation. This organization rates fire departments on a 9-1 scale and insurance companies use that rating to help determine insurance costs for businesses and residences. Our last evaluation was completed in February of 1999 and we are currently rated a "6" (lower score is better). Macedonia Fire Department went under review this year and during the process I.S.O. could not find any records of Northfield Village Fire Department. I contacted them and it turns they were unsure of our department's status as information requests in 2004 and 2009 were never answered. I contacted Mr. Ball and set up this appointment with him to get our department back into compliance. This is an extensive and in depth process where all aspects of fire department operations are evaluated. It is my hope we will be able to improve our score.
- **Hard Rock Rocksino** – NVFD will be helping the rocksino provide an extensive amount of training to their employees starting December 2, 2013. This training includes Heartsaver CPR, Bloodborne Pathogens, Fire Extinguisher and Crowd Control Manager.

NVFD also tested our current and possible future radio system throughout the Hard Rock on 11/12/2013. The current system had a number of static and broken communication issues throughout the building, while the 800 MHz system was markedly much more reliable and clear. Hard Rock has been notified by their radio company on a possible solution to the poor radio coverage by means of a Bi-Directional Amplifier (\$20-\$30,000)




